

Caitlin co-founded a professional performance group, First Generation Dancers, who performed and taught workshops at festivals all across the province. Caitlin has danced on CITY-TV and CTV programs, on stage with the K-W Symphony Orchestra, at sessions in Ireland, and for many wellknown Celtic musicians, from Pierre Schryer to Ashley Maclsaac. Caitlin teaches and studies dance outside of her full-time hours as a producer for CBC radio. She began teaching the adult Comhaltas class 5 years ago, and delights in teaching all ages and abilities both the history of Irish dance, through the traditional steps, and the exciting contemporary side, through creative choreography. Caitlin brings to each class two principles:instilling in her students a love of Irish culture and music through its dance, and that every body, no matter how old or young, can share this culture by simply moving their feet.

Pat grew up in Ottawa and was introduced to the Irish Community at the age of 17. Her father, a descendant of Irish immigrants, had instilled a pride in the Irish half of her roots and she soon became a regular participant at Irish events in the city. University studies, marriage and children took her out of the loop for a while but she reconnected and joined the Sunday afternoon adult dance class which eventually became Comhaltas.

Pat joined Ottawa Branch of Comhaltas about 20 years ago and was active in many areas over the years. She studied whistle with Comhaltas teachers Sheila White and Duncan Gillis and organized and hosted seisiúns at St. Pat's Hall, The Gap of Dunloe Pub and Gentle Annie's Pub. She also participated in Irish dance classes for many years and in Irish language classes for one season.

Pat has worked tirelessly to promote Ottawa Branch; she has served on the Branch Executive for most of her time as a member and still looks after membership for the Branch.

As Public Relations Officer, Pat was responsible for advertising Comhaltas events such as céilís. concerts and our 2005 Convention. This included designing and distributing posters and ad copy, issuing press releases, organizing and participating in media interviews, etc. as well as preparing and sending out the monthly Ottawa Branch Bulletin. Pat started the electronic version of the Bulletin, producing an attractive, colourful document with photographs and hyperlinks.
